To be perfectly honest with you, I probably worry about more things than I need to (but maybe don't tell my wife that I admitted that!). Recently our new Youth Services Librarian, Libby Edwardson, joined not only our staff, but our community, having made the 1,200 mile trek from Appalachia to Blue Hill with her six children, two dogs and two cats, but minus the family support system she enjoyed before her move. Libby's husband and mother were initially unable to make the move with her, so she has found herself in Blue Hill, juggling all of the transitional details of integrating her children into schools, working full-time at the library, getting to know her new community, plus domestic responsibilities, etc., etc.

In my opinion, bringing a new person not just to a new job—and a key one at that—but to an entirely new community comes with some unwritten responsibilities. As that person's primary contact in a new place, you want to make sure that they fit in with the rest of the staff, know what options are available to them, that they get a good community orientation, know where to buy groceries, and most importantly that they have a strong chance of actually LIKING where they have arrived. You also hope that the community takes notice and is

welcoming to new staff members.

At this time of year when we take stock of what we have to be grateful for, I am so pleased to be a member of the Blue Hill community because, among many other reasons, it has been so welcoming to Libby and her family. Before she arrived, various people generously offered their knowledge of everything from daycare options to available housing to the inner workings of Acadia National Park (Libby's husband is an employee of the Park Service and awaits a pending transfer to Acadia). Then, on her first day on the job, the Friends of the Library welcomed Libby and her family with a gorgeous basket of gifts representing the finest that our community offers: from Lucy's Granola, to homemade pies and jams, a book for every member of her family, an apron with one of those beautiful Jane Crosen maps of the peninsula silkscreened on it, and much more. As if that were not enough, one generous person, aware that Libby has a very full plate during the time of transition, has organized a meal train where various people have signed up to deliver homemade dinners to Libby's house just about every day well into December. The welcome that Libby and her family has received has really made me proud of our community.

Like I said above, I probably worry about more than I really need to, especially in a community like Blue Hill.
