We also have much to celebrate with our successes in 2015. Last year, patron visits totaled nearly 109,500, even higher than our total for 2014. For those who worry that libraries are no longer relevant, we can say with confidence that is not true in Blue Hill, where total use of the library's holdings and electronic content increased nearly three percent in 2015 compared to 2014. Use of digital library offerings showed a staggering rise of nearly 150 percent. We can be proud that our library provides access to the traditional books, magazines, and internet materials, as well as expanded services, such as music download and e-books. Our library staff is happy to help you learn about new options and how to use them on your personal devices, including any tablets, smart phones, or laptops you may have received as holiday gifts. Stop in or make an appointment to learn about using your devices and linking to free content and services through the library.

Finally, many thanks to all of the households that renewed their Friends of the Library memberships and/or contributed to the Library's 2015 Annual Appeal. These direct contributions, along with fundraising events and endowment bequests, are what make this special place possible. Generous contributions from community members and patrons total 80 percent of the Library's budget. We could not do what we do without your support. I look forward to seeing you at the library in 2016!

# From the Director's Desk

Another January has come and gone here at BHPL, my 14th in the library director's chair. The place is starting to feel somewhat familiar, though I was recently referred to by a patron as the "new librarian," which was alright with me. Looking at 2015 we closed the year on a positive note in virtually all respects. Our library services statistics remain very strong, and fundraising also closed out 2015 in good standing.

#### **Library Services 2015**

During 2015 the Blue Hill Public Library:

- Welcomed 119,176 patron visits, which is a slight increase over our 2014 total. In 2015, BHPL averaged 395 visits each business day and issued 579 new library cards.
- Loaned 96,959 physical materials (books, audio, & video on disc, etc.), which represents an average of 321 transactions on each of the 302 business days.
- Digital library use increased considerably. The library provided 6,693 downloads of digital content, audiobooks, Ebooks & sessions on Mango Languages. Digital Library use increased 24.9% compared to the prior year. In addition, Freegal, BHPL's free digital music service provided 14,884 titles (downloads and streaming), a 362% increase over 2014's total of 3,219 titles. Approximately 1,240 songs were provided free to the community each month.
- The library sponsored 405 cultural programs that attracted 9,241 attendees. This includes 201 adult programs with 5,383 attendees, and 204 youth programs enjoyed by 3,858 children, teenagers and parents. It also hosted 481 wide-ranging community meetings with an approximate attendance of 5,766.
- 9,260 computer sessions on our in-house computers and tablets were recorded. The library also provided 21,738 wireless internet sessions. Both numbers are comparable to the prior year.

#### Fundraising 2015

On the fundraising front, we had our strongest year ever. We exceeded our budget-driven annual appeal goal of \$149,500, netting just under \$154,000. The additional funds helped offset other areas of the income budget, including helping to make up for Sedgwick's March appropriation of \$800 less than our requested amount. Fundraising events raised just over \$31,000, which was the most ever. The library also received an additional \$47,000 in grant funding to help improve energy efficiency in our historic downtown building. A portion of that has gone to install more energy-efficient lighting.

#### **Current News and Looking Ahead**

The building has received a lot of attention lately. With the installation of two radiators, we have added more heating to the Blue Hill Room, the area of the library building that has tended to lag behind the rest of the library during heating season. The source of heat remains sustainablyproduced Maine wood pellets. The overhaul of our lighting fixtures to more energy-efficient units is still progressing. We now have most of the library being lit by LED fixtures.

We are now actively pursuing the possible installation of a backup power generator so that BHPL may remain open during a power failure, providing Peninsula residents with a warm, dry place to connect with neighbors and the world when the grid goes down. We have a portion of the necessary funding set aside primarily from gifts made in memory of H. Curtiss Martin, a late Brooksville resident who was extremely pleased to have the library as a warm place to visit during the extended power outage of late 2013. We still do not know the exact costs of such a project, but I am determined to find a way to make a generator installation possible. If you would like to help, please get in touch! Library, we will soon improve the Larchwood Room librarian desk area, which has been a "temporary solution" since it was set up in 2004. Besides these projects, our Building and Grounds

Committee is investigating various strategies to reduce our carbon footprint towards the ultimate

goal of carbon neutrality in our day-to-day operations by 2019, including the feasibility of on-site solar electricity. I caution however that that last initiative is still very much in the "pie in the sky" phase of investigation, so please be patient as we determine its potential. As always, there is a lot going on. Stay tuned!

About her show Megan offers, "Growing up in such a beautiful town has given me a great appreciation for nature's gifts. Studying the delicate patterns in plants

or the fine textures of animals' feathers or fur allows me to capture a glimpse of what our natural world presents every day. The Blue Hill Fair board has been wonderful to work with, trusting





me to completely take charge of the theme and presentation every year."

Megan started taking weekly private art lessons at 12 years old. She attended

one semester at Portland School of Art before transferring to the University of Maine in Orono, where she received a BA in Art Education with a Concentration in Developmental Disabilities. She also has a Master of Arts in Art Therapy from Vermont College, and an Independent Maine Clinical Counseling License in 1999. Megan uses visual and expressive art as well as clinical expertise in her job as a counselor at Blue Hill Consolidated School.

### One Park, One Read: Celebrating Acadia's 100th Birthday

BHPL is recognizing the centennial of Acadia National Park by participating in the *One Park*, *One Read* community book series organized by MDI librarians. Marge Irvine will lead discussions for the 2 adult titles, and Youth Librarian, Libby Edwardson will handle the YA book. The chosen books are:

FIC: Spoonhandle by Ruth Moore, February 22<sup>nd</sup>—If you haven't read Ruth Moore's work, you should. Really. She is a Maine original, born on Gott's Island. Ruth spent much of her career working for Reader's Digest. Then in the 1950s her big break came: a film of *Spoonhandle* was adapted and shot on Vinalhaven, allowing her to return to her native state with her partner, Eleanor Mayo, to write full time. She and Ms. Mayo built a home in a stunning Bass Harbor location where they spent their remaining years, both writing Maine fiction. Since the 1990's Ruth's Maine champion has been Brunswick's Gulf of Maine Books owner, Gary Lawless, who continues to keep her works in print.

NONFIC: The End of Night: Searching for Natural Darkness in an Age of Artificial Light by Paul Bogard, March 7<sup>th</sup>—Publisher Marketing: A deeply panoramic tour of the night, from its brightest spots to the darkest skies we have left. A starry night is one of nature's most magical wonders. Yet in our artificially lit world, three-quarters of Americans' eyes never switch to night vision and most of us no longer experience true darkness. In *The End Of Night*, Paul Bogard restores our awareness of the spectacularly primal, wildly dark night sky and how it has influenced the human experience across everything from science to art.

YA FIC: Small as an Elephant by Jennifer Richard Jacobson, March 19<sup>th</sup>—A really great and quick YA read that takes us through lots of familiar local spots in Acadia National Park. Publisher Marketing: When eleven-year-old Jack Martel crawls out of his pup tent on the first morning of his camping trip with his mom in Acadia National Park, he notices right away that something isn't right. Where is his mom s tent, and their rental car? And where is his mom? Any other kid might panic, might even go to the police. But Jack isn't like other kids. And his mom isn't like other moms. Jack knows that it's up to him to find his mom before someone figures out what's happened and separates them forever.

#### Great Discoveries Discussion Program Returns

With funding from the Friends of the Library, we are also sponsoring another session of the Foreign Policy Association's *Great Decisions Discussion Program.* If you are not familiar with the series, "the program model involves reading the Great Decisions Briefing Book, watching the DVD and meeting in a Discussion Group to discuss the most critical global issues facing America today."
