Little Big Man (1970) Thursday, January 8, 7pm


Starring: Dustin Hoffman, Martin Balsam, Fay Dunaway, Chief Dan George

Story Line: In the present day, 1970, 121year-old Jack Crabb (Dustin Hoffman), who resides in a hospice, is recounting his long and colorful life story to a curious historian. Among other things, Crabb claims to have been a captive of the Cheyenne, a gunslinger, an associate of

Wild Bill Hickok, and a scout for General George Armstrong Custer. Having been adopted by the Cheyenne and reared in their culture, Crabb has perspective on both Caucasian and Native American life in the 19th century. Crabb's narrative abruptly ends and he tells the historian to leave the room. The film concludes with an extended shot of the elderly Jack sadly staring into space.

Light Up the Sky is a wonderful comedy written by Tony and Pulitzer Prize winner Moss Hart, one of only two plays that he wrote without a co-writer. Hart also wrote four successful screenplays. Undoubtedly, he would have accomplished a great many more successes had he not succumbed to a heart attack at the age of 51. In this rollicking comedy, it's opening night for the Boston tryout of a play prior to its expected opening on Broadway. The playwright, Peter Sloan, a former truck driver, is excited about the opening of his first play. The Producer Sidney Black, Director Carleton Fitzgerald, and others gather with Sloan in the suite of the star, Irene Livingston, at the Ritz

Carlton to toast to Peter's success. Dress rehearsal was held the previous evening, and unfortunately, Stella Livingston, Irene's mother, was able to sneak into the balcony to watch the performance and has secretly told Sidney's wife that the play is a disaster!

2015 business hours

With passage of the most recent operating budget, it's now official: The Blue Hill Library will be open an hour earlier at 9:00AM each business day beginning on February 2nd, 2015. This is the logical next step towards increasing access to the library, following the addition of Saturday afternoon hours back in 2013. With this step, BHPL will be open 55 hours weekly. Yay!

November Numbers

Speaking of being open more, I was interested to see that during November, including the week of electricity outages, BHPI's foot traffic increased by about 1,000 clicks. If you were here, you may recall that, with thousands of homes without heat or power, the Peninsula converged on the library to stay warm, charge their devices and to keep from reenacting the Shining if they stayed home.

Grants to Green

Last month I mentioned a bit about our decreased electricity consumption in the last ten years, and that efforts were underway to improve on those results. I am pleased to report that since then, BHPL was awarded a grant in the Grants to Green Maine program. Phase I of this program will partially fund an extensive audit of the library's facility. The result of that audit will be a comprehensive report that identifies steps we can take to lower our energy costs and environmental footprint. Phase 2 of the grant will provide matching funds towards those remedies, up to \$100,000. This is a really exciting opportunity that I am looking forward to working towards.

2015 Programming Theme

You may have already heard that we've decided to make history the focus of our 2015 programming, and I am looking forward (and backward too) to the possibilities. The Friends have generously contributed funding to help with the effort. So far our potential topics include:

- The history of art in Maine
- Importance of historic preservation
- Bob Slaven on maritime history
- Red Paint People
- Historic apples / heirloom seeds / what we can learn about historic agriculture from Jonathan Fisher
- Recognition of Acadia's centennial in 2016
- The history of BHPL
- An historic look at Blue Hill area writers
