Letter From the President

What a remarkable winter this has been for a good read! I don't want to pile on to the seemingly endless conversation about weather, other than to say that despite all the snow, ice, school closures, and shocking cold, the Library has only closed one day due to weather. Remember that even if you can't make it into the building, many Library services are available online, including renewals, placing holds, and, of course, digital selections for books, periodicals, and music.

While visiting the Library remains a popular choice (we had 118, 816 patron visits in 2014, an increase of 4.2% over 2013), the most impressive growth in numbers is related to electronic offerings. In 2014, we had a 27.1% increase in computer and Wi-Fi usage and 15% increase in digital library use compared to 2013. Visit the Library's website for information about all of these services. If you need help gaining access, please call the Library staff for assistance.

When you do make it on to the roads, remember that the Library now has extended hours, now opening at 9AM (instead of 10AM) on Monday through Saturday. This extra hour has proven to be nice, quiet time for reading the newspaper (and having coffee here) and a perfect stop after dropping the kids at school. Thank you to all the Library supporters who have helped make this increase in hours possible.

To keep well stocked on good reads to carry you through until spring, check out the Library's used book sale held on the first Saturday of each month. We continuously receive generous donations of wonderful books in just about every category you might want, including mysteries, cooking, history, children's books, and yes, gardening - prepare for spring!

Strategic Planning Update

Lately, in between snowstorms, members of the BHPL board have been working on strategic planning. Here is an update on the process: The process of seeking your input has gone very well. 452 individuals responded to our online survey and a total of 89 people were interviewed, either individually, or in groups. We hosted gatherings representing staff, seniors, middle school and high school, current and former members of the BHPL board, homeschoolers, area non-profits and businesses, Peninsula librarians and town officials.

The feedback we got was engaged, passionate and generally supportive of the direction the library has taken in the past. The online survey in particular had lots of great comments. Just for fun, I plugged all of the unedited words in response to survey question #1 -- "briefly, what words do you use to describe the library"--

into a word cloud generator, and the results are really sweet! We heard compliment after compliment about BHPL being forward-thinking, welcoming, aware of our role, responsive, etc.

<u>All</u> of the respondents who answered the question about satisfaction with the library replied that they are to some degree happy with our services, 3% are satisfied, 14% are pleased and 75% are very pleased. (8% did not reply to that question.)



When asked if they do not use the library regularly, what would compel them to do so, one wise guy replied that a fancy bar with craft cocktails and good music would get him/her in the door. We're working on that.

In general it seems that people are satisfied with our schedule, particularly now that we are open Saturday afternoons, and more recently since the survey was issued, at 9:00AM Monday- Saturday. A lot of people cited Sundays as a major time of interest to visit the library as well.

When we asked people about other services not currently offered by the library that they would like to see, we got a ton of imaginative ideas to consider. Answers ranged from a café, more digitized local history, singalongs, computer courses, art instruction, homework help, Scrabble competitions, tool lending, skeet shooting (!), a piano bar with gin and tonics, etc. (I think that might be the same wiseguy mentioned above. S/he must have been having a stressful day!) One forward-thinking person suggested that BHPL schedule all community spaces to achieve one-stop shopping when looking for a meeting space.

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Throughout the survey, the few negative comments I read with any consistency were related to a lack of adequate parking, cost of overdue materials, and an interest in more guidance for accessing digital services, particularly among seniors.

All in all, this has been a rewarding exercise so far. I am grateful to all who have contributed, and I am optimistic that in May or June we will have a cohesive plan to share with you.

Governor's Budget Proposal

The library is strictly a non-partisan organization, and people of all political stripes are welcome and encouraged to use our services, get involved and just generally be themselves. However, I do feel like one of my obligations is to inform you when pending laws can impact library services. With that preamble out of the way, there are some aspects of Governor Paul Lepage's current budget proposal that have caused concern in the nonprofit and library communities.

Elimination of revenue sharing: Revenue sharing is the process by which the state government recognizes that some of its works are carried out by local municipalities. The system was established in 1972, stipulating that 5% of the state's sales and income tax be redistributed back to municipalities. Increasingly since 2010 state government has been using it to balance its budget instead. The governor's current budget calls for the elimination of revenue sharing, which would amount to somewhere between \$60,000 and \$100,000 less dollars coming back to Blue Hill.

Taxes on non-profits: The IRS certifies that certain educational and scientific organizations should be taxexempt, and similarly many nonprofit organizations like BHPL do not pay local property taxes. The Governor's proposed budget would allow for taxing any nonprofit whose assessed property value exceeds \$500,000. While some organizations would still be exempt, such as churches, and the proposal specifies taxing them at half the normal rate, the impact to BHPL would be an additional \$5,000-\$10,000 annual bill.

Maine income tax changes: The proposed budget also reportedly would eliminate itemized deductions on Maine income tax returns. This means that donors who make a charitable contribution to a nonprofit such as the library would no longer enjoy a tax advantage at <u>the state level</u>.

The proposed budget represents serious challenges to many nonprofits, if passed unchanged.

Grants to Green Update

Regular readers of this newsletter may remember that the library is a member of the Grants to Green Maine program. The aim of this program is to improve the energy efficiency of Maine's historic downtown buildings occupied by nonprofit organizations in Maine.

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At this point we have finished phase 1 of the process, having completed an extensive energy audit. The results of the audit are very helpful, and qualify us to apply for matching funding in phase 2 of the process, implementation of recommended remediations to the facility. We are currently working on that application.

Here are some of the changes that could potentially be funded by phase 2, pending award of the grant and securing local matching funds:

Retrofit most existing light fixtures to LED lights

Upgrade our HVAC system to more efficient means of heating and cooling

Add additional insulation to the basement foundation, etc. (The auditor was impressed with the past weatherization work that had been done in this regard).

If all proposed changes are funded the library would save upwards of an estimated \$8,600 in annual electricity and heating costs (10 tons of pellets plus 32,000kwh annually), save an estimated 24 tons of CO₂ from entering the atmosphere, and would proactively head off some future maintenance challenges.

I am looking forward to whatever improvements we can make to lighten our environmental impact and will try to keep you posted as we move forward.
