From the Director's Desk

Out of Office Autoreply: at press time the newsletter author you normally see in this space is off on Vacation, camping in the wilds of Canada. For this edition of The Library Page, Hannah Cyrus, who recently joined BHPL as Assistant Director, will provide you with her thoughts and impressions of the library and community after just two months on the job. Take it away, Hannah...

When I was finishing graduate school in Boston, I knew I wanted a very specific job. I wanted to move back to Maine, first and foremost, and to work in a public library. I knew I wanted to be in a small town, and ideally I wanted a job where I could answer reference questions, create library programs and events, and work in circulation, getting a chance to really meet and get to know the library patrons. I wanted a job with enough variety to keep me busy, in a library that really took to heart the mission of being a center of community.

While this sounds like a perfect description of Blue Hill, that kind of job is incredibly rare. Many of my classmates, especially the ones who wanted to stay in Boston, were having trouble finding work in a library at all, and I settled myself in for a long haul of a job search. Resigned to another sweltering summer in the city, I decided I would wait as long as I needed to and hold out for just the right thing. Blue Hill was the fourth job I applied to, and definitely the one I wanted the most. I left my interview unable to stop thinking of how much I would like to live and work here.

To say I was surprised when I was offered the Assistant Director position here would be an understatement. I was floored, overjoyed. In the span of two weeks, I graduated with my Master's degree, quit my office job, packed everything I owned, said goodbye to my friends and my sister in Boston, bought a car, and moved to Blue Hill. And let me tell you, I have no regrets.

My first few weeks in town came with so many wonderful experiences: a huge, generous bag of gifts from the Friends of the Library and the Library Board, full of homemade canned goods, local gift certificates, and many other goodies; a driving tour of the peninsula from Rich; invitations to dinner from friends new and old (which I happily accepted, since I can't cook my way out of a paper bag); and one incredibly illuminating week of training from my inimitable predecessor, Karen. I swam in the Salt Pond, climbed Blue Hill Mountain, and did some less romantic things like opening a checking account and registering my car. I started to feel at home.

Through it all, I have been uniformly impressed by the beautiful library, the amazing staff who have welcomed me, and the patrons who come through our doors. My favorite thing about being here and having this job is how, every time I introduce myself to someone new and say I work at the library, they respond, "Oh, I *love* that library!" This has happened to me without fail, and it's a truly special thing.

When you spend two and a half years studying librarianship, you get some pretty detailed ideas of what a library should be and do, and it can be hard for any real place to live up to those dreams. I'm happy to say that the Blue Hill Library does, and more. From its inception, this library has been so progressive, with its 1930s bookmobile, film screenings and lectures, and the belief that anyone with any interest should be able to express that and find it supported by the library. I feel so privileged to be part of the legacy that will keep those ideals going, a legacy of smart, dedicated, unflinching women and men who have worked here before (and with!) me.

So thank you, to all who have welcomed me with such open arms. I hope folks in the library and around town will continue to introduce themselves to me, and I promise I will remember the names eventually! And if you have a question you want answered, some research you need help with, an event you'd like to see (or host!), or any suggestions for what you want your library to be, please come see me. That's what I'm here for, after all.

Live & Learn: Identifying Mushrooms Safely

BLUE HILL –Brooklin resident Dr. David Porter will give a talk about mushrooms found in the wild—the ones to enjoy and the ones to avoid—at the Blue Hill Public Library Thursday September 1st at 7:00 PM. This talk, entitled "Identifying Mushrooms Safely," is part of the Library's Live & Learn series—supported by Friends of the Library.

David Porter moved to Brooklin in 2006 after a 38 year career in academics as a professor in the Plant Biology Department at the University of Georgia. His specialty is mycology, which is the study of mushrooms and other fungi.

Dr. Porter teaches a class in Fungal Ecology at the College of the Atlantic. He has given various mushroom related outreach programs through the Maine Mycological Association, Colloquy Downeast, Acadia National Park, Downeast Audubon, and local land trusts.
