

Built with donations of a \$1 and "A Days Work"




This year we mark our 75th anniversary in the building that BHPL calls home. Our reference librarian Karen Wyatt recently unearthed a poster about a library fundraiser in 1893. It was for a drama called "Rebecca's Triumph" and the poster exclaims "Come one! Come all! And help to swell

the proceeds that are to be added to the fund being raised to erect a LIBRARY BUILDING." The cast included Eliza Herrick, Lena and Fosta Hinckley, Lizzie Grindle and Carrie Dodge. Tickets were 25 cents for adults, 15 for children.

We don't know how much money was raised that night, but we do know that it would take almost 50 more years to make the

We are often asked if the Blue Hill Library is a "Carnegie building." The assumption is logical considering the substantial and elegant design. But we are proud to explain that BHPL was created and half funded by the community. While we are the honored recipients of an endowment from Adelaide Pearson and a PWA construction grant from the New Deal, the library would never have happened without the donation of time, labor and money from many Blue Hill residents.

Interestingly, at the time not everyone agreed that Blue Hill needed a free-standing, full-service library. One resident pledged \$100 but felt the need to put in a pitch for a new hotel instead:

"I feel you are working on rather a large scale for a place as small as Blue Hill. Out of all proportion to the other buildings. It would be fine to have a nice small library large enough to be convenient. What we really need is a fit place for one to stop. I really feel ashamed to tell any of my friends there is not place for them to go, not even a good boarding house. Well everyone to his own ideas."

Too bad we can't tell her that not only would the Blue Hill Library outgrow the "rather large" structure built in 1940, but it was so popular we needed to double its size in 2000. Plus, we now have three very respectable Inns for our visitors to stop and get a good night's sleep. All told, it's a happy ending fit for a play called "Blue Hill's Triumph." -Shelley Latham

Libby Edwardson: New Youth Services Libbrian

As you may already know, in September we said goodbye to Pat Horton, our Youth Services Librarian for the past 6 years. I am happy to report to you that we have found Pat's successor, Elizabeth "Libby" Edwardson, to serve our younger patrons. Libby comes to BHPL with varied experiences. Most recently she worked as a Bookmobile and Outreach Librarian in Bell County, Kentucky. Her clients in Appalachia ranged from seniors to the incarcerated. A big part of her job has been working with teens and "tweens." Libby created activities ranging from a "zombie Prom" to a writing group for teens. She was also actively involved in programs that promote tolerance, such as a Gay/ Straight Alliance. While at the Bell County Library, she co-founded a library



program called "52 Weeks of Giving" which subsequently morphed into a standalone nonprofit dedicated to weekly acts of kindness, both local and global. Prior to Bell County Libby worked as a middle school drama coach, and did some outreach work for the Girl Scouts. Libby moved to the area in early November, along with her husband, six kids, two pugs and two kittens. Please join me in extending a warm welcome to Libby and her family.

THE ANNUAL FUND DRIVE: HOW WE KEEP THE DOORS OPEN

The library is a treasured community resource, made possible by your tax-deductible donations.

Why?

The Blue Hill Public Library is an <u>independent non-profit organization</u>. It is "public" because our mission is to provide free access to information to everyone who seeks our services. About **17% of the library's budget comes from four area towns**: Blue Hill, Surry, Sedgwick and Penobscot, with most of this money coming from Blue Hill.

Who?

<u>You!</u> 83% of of funding comes from patrons in the form of direct donations, fees, fundraising events, gifts to the endowment and bequests. Your donation helps support library services for over 4,500 households from all the towns on the Peninsula.
